The last 20 months have tested and challenged many in our school community. If we rewind for a moment to March 2020 you will have seen a school that was operating exactly how a school should: students enjoying their lessons, lots of opportunity outside of the classroom and our Year 11 students readying themselves for the summer exams. However, what none of us could have seen coming was the disruption and fracture caused by Covid 19. As the virus took hold of the country and forced schools to move online our school community revealed a strength of character and sense of spirit that humbled many of us here at BCA. I was proud to see the school community remain connected when the situation required us to be physically apart for so long.

Thankfully, since September 2021 school has been operating pretty much normally. It has been a real joy to see so much of our school come back

to life without the need for bubbles, zones and restrictions. This has meant the vast range of opportunities we provide students have returned. The reality is that the pandemic has revealed a generation of children who are resilient and in the case of the students here at BCA are unwilling to allow their futures to be defined by the pandemic. Whilst we recognise and will support any of our children who have been significantly impacted by the pandemic, especially in relation to their mental health, I am intent on ensuring our students continue to thrive and achieve whilst they are a BCA student.

So we have much to look forward to in the coming months as we look to continue the journey back to a vibrant, connected and happy school community. I'll look forward to welcoming you back in person in 2022 and beyond.

SUMMER SCHOOL

The aim of the **Government funded programme** was to deliver a short summer school with a blend of academic education and enrichment activities. **BCA's Summer School was open to all Year 6 students who has been offered a place in our Year 7 cohort on September 2021.** We wanted to offer the provision as part of our extensive Transition programme. The move to secondary school can be challenging for some and we were acutely aware that the impact of the pandemic has increased this challenge. Students were invited to opt into one of two weeks meaning they were on site for 5 full days. They engaged in a range of activities with our very own staff with academic session including **English, Maths, Performing Arts and PE.** We also spent a day on the outdoor climbing wall and took part in archery sessions with our skilled instructors. All of the food and drink were supplied for the students and were cooked on site by our very own support staff. Students also spent a day working with leaders from **'The Standing Tall Foundation'** learning life skills and working as a team. Pastoral and support staff were on hand throughout the week to ensure a safe and secure environment for our groups.

The **103 students** who attended had the opportunity to: - build a community with their fellow pupils - forge relationships with new teachers - familiarize themselves with their new school environment - feel part of the BCA community and remove any potential barriers to learning.

We know these devices were used successfully in Italy when hospitals were really struggling, so we thought we'd use our expertise to do the same here in the UK. We know these aren't a ventilator but they might help ease the pressure on our emergency services and we're ready to manufacture more if the NHS needs our help.

The Fablab is also producing face shields which are in short supply in local hospitals and across the UK.


READING CURRICULUM

Every student in Key Stage three has timetabled Reading Curriculum lessons which are rooted in embedding reciprocal reading strategies. Students read a wide range of texts that encompass other curriculum areas in order to broaden their vocabulary as well as expose them to a wider range of knowledge about the world that they live in

These lessons focus primarily on vocabulary acquisition and students are given lots of opportunity to practice using these words within the lessons. All of the staff at BCA are trained in the delivery of reading and these skills are starting to permeate all curriculum areas.

Students are enjoying the challenge of these lessons and it is fantastic to see the culture of reading at the academy flourish.






PRIMARY PRIMARY





In total, 21 pupils from Year 8, 9 and 10 as well as Miss Higham, Mrs Tickle and Miss Hankinson, three of our teachers here at BCA, designed and delivered a carousel of activities teaching Year 7 pupils a taster of 14 different languages.
