- **To evaluate** choosing suitable materials, and evaluating processes, suggesting improvements to their product and processes conducted.

Exploring Career Pathways: A Recap of National Careers Week at Beamont Collegiate Academy. Last half-term marked an exciting chapter in the journey of our students at Beamont Collegiate Academy as we celebrated National Careers Week. From the 4th to the 8th March, students were presented with a wide range of opportunities to support them with their career choices and continue to support their aspirations. At BCA, we believe that the curriculum is more than what we teach in the classroom and this week was the perfect opportunity for students to step out of the classroom and see where their studies can take them.

With a line-up of 31 sessions spanning a spectrum of fields, ranging from traditional professions to cutting-edge industries, our students were given lots of choice. The event was designed to empower students with insights and knowledge about potential career paths.

One of the highlights of the week was the interactive sessions that allowed students to immerse themselves in hands-on experiences. From hairdressing to construction, students had the opportunity to explore vocational skills first-hand. For those inclined towards the legal realm, sessions on law offered an insight into the dynamic world of law, igniting aspirations in budding legal minds.

Photography enthusiasts honed their artistic flair, while psychology sessions delved into the intricacies of the human mind, sparking curiosity and fascination. Our students aspiring for a career within sports were lucky enough to attend sessions run by the Steven Gerrard Academy and a talk from one of our alumni and Warrington Wolves player, Danny walker.

In an increasingly digitised world, the importance of cybersecurity and engineering was reflected in our offer. Students attended a fascinating talk from Balazs, part of our BCA alumni about cyber security, the increase of AI and the threats and opportunities this can bring. Apprenticeships emerged as a popular choice, offering a blend of practical experience and academic learning, while sessions on business management and ownership instilled entrepreneurial aspirations in our students.









We were lucky enough to welcome talks from Cheshire police, the army, the navy and a community pharmacist. Having such a wide range of career talks on offer allowed so many of our students to listen to talks that directly link to their hopes for their future.

In addition to this, students attended a talk on 3D printing which showcased the union of technology and creativity, offering a glimpse into the possibilities of additive manufacturing. With each session, students were encouraged to envision their futures and how they will contribute to the ever-changing world of work.

Budding conservationists in year seven were also given the opportunity to attend a behind the scenes trip to Chester Zoo and our aspiring sports journalists attended a journalism experience at Manchester City's Ethiad stadium. These were brilliant opportunities for our students experience real workplaces.







As part of our National Careers Week activities, we had the pleasure of welcoming back ten esteemed alumni to Beamont Collegiate Academy. These former students returned to impart invaluable wisdom and insights to the current generation. Through engaging talks, they shared their personal experiences. It was truly inspiring to witness how they have flourished in their respective professions and our students enjoyed learning from our alumni.

The response was overwhelming, with over 650 students seizing the opportunity to participate in the sessions throughout the week. The enthusiasm and engagement demonstrated by our students underscored the success of the event, reaffirming our commitment to nurturing well-rounded individuals prepared for the challenges of the professional world.

DANIEL BEECH

Head of Science

In 2015/16 when I undertook my teacher training, I was awarded a scholarship from the Royal Society of Chemistry. The Royal Society of Chemistry (RSC) is a learned society/ the professional body for chemistry in the UK. It carries out research, publishes journals, books, hosts conferences and accredits university degrees. Education in Chemistry is a print/ online magazine covering all areas of chemistry education, mainly concentrating on the teaching of chemistry at secondary school.

This Scholarship enabled wider networking opportunities which ultimately lead to my involvement in working with their Education in Chemistry section.

My work mainly involves writing articles on how to teach certain aspects of chemistry, general pedagogy techniques, running remote CPD and acting as a quality assurer for CPD courses provided by the RSC.

Currently, I have written articles on a wide range of topics such as assessment, questioning, practical skills, UN sustainability goals and anticancer drugs.

A particular highlight was having an article based on feedback shared by the Education Endowment Foundation linked to their guidance report, 'Improving Secondary Science'. BCA is an RSC Teach Chemistry school which gives us access to high -quality resources, CPD and subject expertise that has helped to inform curriculum decisions.

Head of IT

Over Christmas Paul Jones a Computing teacher at BCA completed an endurance challenge in an attempt to raise funds for one of our local grassroots football clubs, Bruche Athletic. They have a cabin based in Woolston park and it is in dire need of some repairs and improvements. The hub serves hundreds of our local kids, with multiple teams at many age groups, right the way through from 5 years old's at the academy, to Under 17s, including Paul's son at under 7s. Paul decided to engage in a challenge, that he and a couple of the other coaches had dubbed 'Beat the moon', whereby they set themselves endurance tests to complete during the daylight hours of 28th December, between 8.07am and 3.58pm. 

HARRIET EVANS

Harriet Evans - PE teacher and Leader of Health and Social Care

I have recently completed an NPQ in Leading Teaching. I was originally interested in this specific course as the framework outlined learning around; approaches for how pupils learn, curriculum development and the implementation of strategies, areas I have always been particularly interested in. After reviewing the different NPQ courses available, I felt



that the Leading Teaching qualification was most suited to supporting my professional development based on my current experiences and career to date. The course provided opportunities for learning both remotely and face-to-face. It was particularly helpful to collaborate with colleagues who share different levels of experience during the face-to-face events, some who have been subject leaders for several years and others, like myself, who have no experience leading a department. The online learning provided me with a bank of research informed strategies for improving teaching and learning that would support teachers of varying levels of experience, alongside specific approaches to managing a subject effectively. I started the course with no experience leading teaching, therefore I found learning about the planning and implementation of new strategies particularly insightful, as well as approaches to managing and delivering departmental CPD. The course provides you with an online learning mentor and also requires an experienced member of your school to act as your in-school coach. Their role is to support and challenge your learning, providing quidance through the formative and summative assessments. During my time completing my NPQ, I started a position of Subject Leader of Health and Social Care within my school. It has been great to have the opportunity to put my learning into practice. I would recommend completing an NPQ to anyone interested in developing their professional skill set and challenging themselves in their career.

SHONA CROSSAN

History Teacher and Head of Year 10

Shona Crossan has recently passed her NPQLBC - National Professional Qualification for Leading Behaviour and Culture. This is why she chose to study this course.

I chose to study this course to further develop my role within school around behaviour and safeguarding. My passion and strengths are aimed towards establishing strong cultures based on consistent routines and high expectations. The NPQLBC has enabled me to deepen my understanding of conditions for good behaviours and how to embed and sustain these models alongside positive learning across all the whole school.



As well as extending my own knowledge and skills, the purpose of the NPQLBC course is to strengthen leadership skills and management qualities to better-support colleagues with theirs. Assessments are often centred around supporting colleagues to implement good behaviour practices, supplemented by face-to-face events.

The course is designed to challenge candidates/participants/? and encourages selfreflection of our own presence, attitude and behaviours which in turn impacts upon pupils learning.

Overall, the course has been beneficial to my development, creating a greater understanding of how rich learning environments, committed teachers and a strong behaviour culture, encourage pupils to flourish.
